## **FOREWORD**

This publication sets forth all of the requests made by the Hawaii State Legislature during the Regular Session of 2013 to agencies and officials of the federal, state and county governments and of quasi-public and private agencies. These requests are contained in acts enacted by the Legislature or bills that have been passed but which have yet to be approved by the Governor. These acts or bills include specific requests for submission of information back to the Legislature, excluding annual and other reports requested on an indefinite basis. These requests are also contained in resolutions adopted by the Senate or House of Representatives or by the whole Legislature. Dates by which reports and other responses are expected are indicated when specifically set by the Legislature. The names of the agencies involved in the conduct of a study or the execution of a request are underscored.

For the reader's convenience these legislative requests are also grouped together by agencies (see agency index); as well as by subject matter (see subject index).

MEDICAID BUY-IN PROGRAM. Extends the joint legislative task force to assist in exploring the development and possible implementation of a medicaid buy-in program for working individuals with disabilities which requires the Chairperson of the Senate Committee on Human Services and the Chairperson of the House of Representatives Committee on Human Services to co-chair the joint legislative task force.

#### Requires the task force to include:

- (1) The <u>Department of Human Services, Med-QUEST Division</u>;
- (2) The <u>Department of Human Services</u>, <u>Vocational Rehabilitation and Services for the Blind Division</u>, <u>Services for the Blind Branch (Hoʻopono)</u>;
- (3) Each of the QUEST expanded access plans;
- (4) The Department of Health, Developmental Disabilities Division;
- (5) The Department of Health, Adult Mental Health Division;
- (6) The Department of Health, Disability and Communication Access Board;
- (7) The <u>Department of Labor and Industrial Relations</u>, Workforce Development Council:
- (8) The State Rehabilitation Council;
- (9) The State Council on Developmental Disabilities;
- (10) The University of Hawaii, Center on Disability Studies;
- (11) Hawaii Waiver Providers Association;
- (12) One or more mental health clubhouses;
- (13) The Hawaii Centers for Independent Living;
- (14) The Hawaii Disability Rights Center;
- (15) The National Federation of the Blind, Hawaii Chapter:
- (16) The Hawaii Association of the Blind;
- (17) The Aloha State Association of the Deaf;
- (18) Hawaii Families as Allies, Hawaii Youth Helping Youth;
- (19) Aloha Independent Living Hawaii:
- (20) Consumer Family and Youth Alliance; and
- (21) One or more representatives from each of the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui.

Further requires the task force to submit a final report of its findings, program recommendations, and proposed legislation, if any, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

Further requires the Legislative Reference Bureau to assist the task force in drafting the reports and any proposed legislation to implement the task force's recommendations and provides that the task force shall submit a draft of the final report and any proposed legislation to the bureau no later than November 1, 2013.

#### SB 46, SD2, HD3, CD1

PRIVATE COLLEGE OR UNIVERSITY, SEMINARY, OR RELIGIOUS TRAINING INSTITUTION, AUTHORIZATION OF. Requires the <u>Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs</u> to report on such matters including:

- (1) The status of any rulemaking, including interim rules, the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs has undertaken:
- (2) The number of private colleges or universities, seminaries, and religious training institutions that have applied for authorization under this Act;
- (3) A summary of all complaints, if any, received by the Department against any private college or university, seminary, and religious training institution authorized pursuant to this Act:
- (4) A summary of all investigations, if any, conducted by the Department pursuant to this Act;
- (5) The number of private colleges or universities, seminaries, and religious training institutions, if any, that have closed during the reporting period;
- (6) An update on the Departments' efforts in implementing the provisions of this Act;
- (7) An update of the Departments' budget as it relates to the implementation of this Act:
- (8) Any proposed amendments to the authorization fee structure;
- (9) A summary of the Departments' efforts to enter into a reciprocity agreement with any other state, including the status of any reciprocity agreement; and
- (10) Any proposed legislation.

Further requires the Director report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## SB 106, SD1, HD1, CD1

TRANSPORTATION TO ASSIST ELDERS AND INDIVIDUALS WITH DISABILITIES. Establishes a <u>task force on mobility management</u> within the <u>Department of Health</u> to make recommendations on establishing a transportation framework to assist elders and individuals with disabilities with transportation needs in each county, including recommendations relating to the state budget and program development.

Requires the task force to consider:

- (1) Developing and establishing a program in which a single entity in a geographical area is charged with administering an array of transportation resources;
- (2) The cost and qualifications of transportation coordinators or operators and the logistics of the arrangements and delivery of transportation services, including cost reimbursements, insurance, and liability; and
- (3) Developing a mobility management master plan for each county to:
  - (A) Address the growing demands for transportation services;
  - (B) Encourage living at home;
  - (C) Improve efficiencies in the use of public and private sector vehicles;
  - (D) Use modern technology in the management of transportation services; and

(E) Include a transportation service component that utilizes the transportation resources of nonprofit organizations that are willing to participate in a vehicle-sharing network to provide on-call transportation services to elders and individuals with disabilities residing in each county.

Further requires the task force to consist of the following members, or their designees:

- (1) The <u>Director of the Executive Office on Aging</u>, who shall serve as chairperson of the task force;
- (2) The Chairperson of the Public Utilities Commission;
- (3) The Executive Director of the Disability and Communication Access Board;
- (4) Two administrators of a federally qualified health center or rural health clinic, of which one representative shall be from a rural community and one representative shall be from an urban community, to be appointed by the Director of the Executive Office on Aging;
- (5) The Directors of Transportation Services from each of the four counties;
- (6) One member of the House of Representatives, to be designated by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (7) One member of the Senate, to be designated by the President of the Senate;
- (8) One representative from the agency on aging of each of the four counties, to be appointed by the Mayor of the respective county;
- (9) The Director of Health;
- (10) Service providers from two counties;
- (11) Consumer representatives from counties not represented by service providers; and
- (12) Representatives from the business community.

Requires the Department of Health, through the <u>Executive Office on Aging</u> to submit an interim report of the task force's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014, and a final report of the task force's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015.

## SB 237, SD2, HD1, CD1

PUBLIC SCHOOLS LANDS, PILOT PROGRAM TO LEASE. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to submit a report that includes:

- (1) A timeline for the pilot program pursuant to this Act, including but not limited to:
  - (A) A timeline for the redevelopment of each selected site;
  - (B) An estimate start and completion date for each selected site; and
  - (C) Estimates for the time required to obtain any necessary county or state approvals required to complete the redevelopment of each site;
- (2) A summary of the Department's activities, results, and recommendations to optimize the use of public school lands as a means to build or renovate twenty-first century schools and school-centered communities;

- (3) A summary of all school and community engagement efforts undertaken or that will be undertaken by the Department in carrying out the pilot program pursuant to this Act;
- (4) A summary of the Department's current and projected budgeted expenses, including the identification of any contracts with third parties and the creation of temporary positions within the Department in carrying out the pilot program pursuant to this Act;
- (5) A summary of any capacity and funding issues or challenges the Department has encountered in carrying out the pilot project pursuant to this Act; and
- (6) Any proposed legislation

to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014 and each regular session thereafter until the completion of each project authorized pursuant to this Act.

## SB 310, SD2, HD2, CD1

MENTALLY ILL, ASSISTED COMMUNITY TREATMENT PROGRAM FOR. Requires an entity designated by the <u>Department of Health</u> to gather information from treating providers related to MH-1s and hospitalization of persons who are under an order to treat and submit an annual report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of every Regular Session. (Act to be repealed on July 1, 2020.)

#### SB 319, HD1

THRILL CRAFT USE TO CONDUCT OCEAN CLEANUP. Requires the <u>Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources</u> to report on the rules adopted by the Department that allow a person to operate a thrill craft in the waters of the State when used to conduct ocean cleanup to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

## SB0326, SD1, HD1, CD1

FOOD SAFETY, AGRICULTURAL PRACTICES TO IMPROVE. Establishes a <u>good</u> <u>agricultural practices task force</u> to identify and develop good agricultural practices and preventative measure guidelines in the food supply system to improve the overall safety of locally grown food.

Requires the <u>Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture</u> or the chairperson's designee to serve as chair of the task force and that the task force be composed of:

- (1) The Director of Health, or the director's designee;
- (2) The <u>Dean of the University of Hawaii College of Tropical Agriculture and Human Resources</u> or the dean's designee;
- (3) The Chair of the Senate Committee on Agriculture;
- (4) The Chair of the House of Representatives Committee on Agriculture;
- (5) The President of the Hawaii Farm Bureau Federation or the president's designee;
- (6) The President of the Hawaii Farmer's Union United or the president's designee;
- (7) <u>Four representatives from agricultural producers statewide</u> selected by the <u>Governor</u>, at least one of which represents the interests of organic farmers; and
- (8) One representative appointed by the Governor from each of the following industries, who shall be requested to serve:
  - (A) Wholesale distribution;
  - (B) Manufacturing;
  - (C) Retail;
  - (D) Hotels;
  - (E) Restaurants; and
  - (F) Farmers' markets.

# Requires the safety task force to:

- (1) Identify and develop good agricultural practices and preventative measure guidelines for agricultural producers to follow, in order to mitigate food safety risks that may arise throughout the farm-to-consumer food supply system; and
- (2) Research other state, county, and organizational policies and suggested best practices related to food safety that may arise in the farm-to-consumer supply system.

Further requires the task force to submit a report of its findings, recommendations, and proposed legislation to the Legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

## SB 515, SD2, HD1, CD1

HOMELESS, SOLUTIONS FOR. Establishes a <u>homeless assistance working group</u> within the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to:

- (1) Work within each local neighborhood in each county to identify various private and public properties whose owners are interested in partnering with the local neighborhood and government to provide land or structures that can be used to provide temporary homes for homeless persons, including people who are living in their motor vehicles;
- (2) Coordinate with the State's homeless programs office and continuum of care providers to match homeless persons in every community with appropriate care and housing;

- (3) Work with non-profit organizations, businesses, and government agencies that may be willing to offer their property for homeless persons living in their motor vehicles and coordinate voluntary participation and support to homeless persons;
- (4) Create, develop, and support the housing options within each local community; and
- (5) Communicate and coordinate with the Hawaii Interagency Council on Homelessness on meeting their goals.

Requires the <u>Director of Human Services</u>, or a designee, to convene the working group and invite the following as members:

- (1) Representatives of homeless service providers;
- (2) Representatives of community and volunteer service organizations, which may include:
  - (A) Community associations;
  - (B) Neighborhood boards; and
  - (C) Faith-based organizations;
- (3) Representatives of property owners who are interested in partnering with the State to provide land, homes, or buildings that can be used to provide homes for homeless persons;
- (4) Representatives of the homeless community who are currently experiencing or formerly experienced homelessness;
- (5) Representatives of environmental organizations;
- (6) Representatives of the architecture, engineering, development, and building industry;
- (7) Representatives of other businesses, including realtors and financial institutions;
- (8) Representatives of labor unions;
- (9) Representatives of legal services;
- (10) Representatives of the technology community;
- (11) <u>Various federal, state, and county and city representatives,</u> including the <u>chair of</u> <u>the Hawaii Interagency Council on Homelessness</u> and <u>Homeless Programs Office Administrator</u>;
- (12) Interested federal, state, county, and city elected officials; and
- (13) Others interested in supporting homeless assistance.

Requires the working group to submit an interim report of its findings and recommendations, including the progress made to provide housing and support services, as appropriate, for homeless persons and any innovative temporary housing solutions, to the Legislature no later than one hundred fifty days after the effective date of this Act.

# SB 551, SD2, HD1, CD1

VETERANS, MEMORIAL HONORING. Requires the <u>Office of Veterans Services</u>, with the assistance of the <u>Department of Accounting and General Services</u>, the <u>Department of Defense</u>, and the <u>State Historic Preservation Division</u> to develop a plan to establish a memorial honoring the veterans of the Persian Gulf War, Operation Desert Storm, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation New Dawn, Global War

on Terrorism, Homeland Defense, and Operation Noble Eagle, and those who have protected our borders by land, sea, and air and to submit a report of its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than January 1, 2014.

#### SB 722, SD2, HD1, CD1

PUBLIC LAND TRUST LANDS, INVENTORY OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND SITES ON. Requires the <u>Department of Accounting and General Services</u> to coordinate efforts to establish a complete and accurate inventory of public buildings, facilities, and sites on the lands of the public land trust to which state agencies hold title or over which they maintain management control by accepting information from state agencies on the inventory of public buildings owned or operated by each agency and for the Department to submit a report to the Legislature of its progress no later than twenty days prior to the commencement of the Regular Session of 2014.

## SB 1087, SD2, HD3, CD1

HAWAII GREEN INFRASTRUCTURE AUTHORITY'S ACTIVITIES AND LOAN PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, and <u>Tourism</u>, with the assistance of the <u>Hawaii Green Infrastructure Authority</u>, to submit a report on the status of the Authority's activities, including approved loan program description and uses; summary information and analytical data concerning implementation of the loan program; summary information and analytical data concerning the deployment of clean energy technology, demand response technology, and energy use reduction and demand-side management infrastructure, programs, and services; and repayments made or credits provided to electric utility customers under section 196-E and part of chapter 269, Hawaii Revised Statutes, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

Requires the Authority to conduct a study in the 2015 calendar year to determine:

- (1) The extent to which the Authority's activities have benefitted the State by advancing the State's renewable energy goals and reducing energy costs for consumers by providing affordable alternative energy options; and
- (2) Whether the loan program shall be extended, eliminated, or otherwise modified beginning July 1, 2016,

and submit a report of its findings from the study to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2016.

#### SB 1093, SD2, HD2, CD1

PRESCHOOL OPEN DOORS PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to report:

- (1) The number of applicants to the preschool open doors program established pursuant to this Act;
- (2) The number of applicants that were placed on a waitlist for the preschool open doors program;
- (3) The geographic distribution of services to participants in the preschool open doors program;
- (4) The number of participating providers; and
- (5) A summary of any capacity and funding issues the Department has experienced in carrying out the purposes of this Act

to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## SB 1206, SD1, HD1, CD1

TAX ASSESSMENT AND COLLECTION. Requires the Director of Taxation to submit a report to the legislature regarding any contract entered into under section 231-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended by this Act, during the period beginning on the effective date of this Act and ending on June 30, 2017, for the assessment, enforcement, or collection of taxes within fourteen days after the contract is entered into.

Further requires the Director to submit an annual report of all contracts entered into under section 231-13, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as amended by this Act, during the one-year period ending on November 30 of each year for the assessment, enforcement, or collection of taxes to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each Regular Session of the Legislature, beginning with the Regular Session of 2014 and ending with the Regular Session of 2017.

Requires the reports to include:

- (1) The purpose and scope of the contract;
- (2) The terms of the contract; and
- (3) The cost of the contract.

Further requires the annual reports to include a summary and analysis of the effect of this Act to date on the assessment, enforcement, and collection of taxes.

#### SB 1349, SD2, HD1, CD1

INCOME TAX CREDIT FOR RESEARCH ACTIVITIES. Requires the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u>, in collaboration with the <u>Department of Taxation</u> to study the effectiveness of the tax credit and requires the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism to submit a report to the legislature on:

- (1) The amount of tax credits claimed and total taxes paid by qualified high technology businesses;
- (2) The number of qualified high technology businesses in each industry sector;
- (3) The numbers and types of jobs created by qualified high technology businesses;
- (4) External services and materials procured by the businesses;
- (5) The compensation levels of jobs provided by qualified high technology businesses;
- (6) Qualified research activities: and
- (7) Any other factors the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism deems relevant

and submit the report to the Legislature by September 1 of each year. (Tax credit shall not apply to taxable years beginning after December 31, 2019.)

## HB 65, HD2, SD2, CD1

PRESCRIPTION DRUGS, PURCHASE OF. Requires <u>each pharmacy benefit manager</u>, <u>prescription drug benefit plan provider</u>, and the <u>Hawaii employer-union health benefits trust fund</u> to submit a report that includes:

- (1) The number of beneficiaries affected by the provisions of this measure (prescription drug benefits);
- (2) The number of beneficiaries who opted out of a requirement to purchase prescription drugs from a mail order pharmacy or, in the case of a prescription drug benefit plan subject to regulation under chapter 432D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the number of beneficiaries who opt to purchase prescription drugs from a retail community pharmacy; and
- (3) The status of the report filed with the insurance commissioner

to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# HB 114, HD3, SD2, CD1

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII'S PROCUREMENT OF CONSTRUCTION, CONTRACTS AND CONSTRUCTION- RELATED CONSULTANT SERVICES. Requires the <u>Administrator of the State Procurement Office</u> to submit a report of the administrator's findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, relating to the transparency, efficiency, and compliance of the University of Hawaii's procurement of construction

contracts and construction-related consultant services pursuant to chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2016.

#### HB 120, HD2, SD2, CD1

CARE HOME FACILITY INSPECTION FORMS. Establishes a <u>working group on licensed</u> <u>care facilities</u> under the <u>Department of Health</u> to develop an inspection form to be posted online with information that is fair to the care home operators and useful to the public. Requires the working group to consist of:

- (1) The <u>Director of Health</u>, who shall serve as the chairperson of the working group;
- (2) The Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs;
- (3) The <u>Chief Information Officer of the Office of Information Management and Technology</u>;
- (4) The Director of the Executive Office on Aging; and
- (5) The Long-term Care Ombudsman.

Requires the Director of Health to invite representatives from major caregiver provider groups from the state-licensed care facilities and advocacy groups to also serve on the working group.

Requires the working group to report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

## HB 152, HD1, SD2, CD1

WORKER'S COMPENSATION MEDICAL FEE SCHEDULE, ADEQUACY OF. Requires the <u>Auditor</u> to submit the recommendation for mandatory periodic review of the adequacy of the medical fee schedule to the Legislature and Director of Labor and Industrial Relations by January 1, 2014.

(HSCR 317, 654, SSCR 965, 1401, CCR 182)

## HB 200, HD1, SD1, CD1

PART III, SECTION 15

HAWAII HEALTH INFORMATION EXCHANGE CONTRACT. Requires the <u>Department of Health</u> to prepare a detailed report on the expenditure and use of funds and performance outcomes for the funds and submit the report to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

#### Part III, SECTION 17

DEPARTMENT OF HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS OPERATING EXPENSES. Requires the <u>Department of Hawaiian Home Lands</u> to prepare a detailed report on the expenditure and use of funds and to submit the report to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014 and .

PART III, SECTION 19

HAWAIIAN LANGUAGE, COMMON CORE STATE STANDARDS ASSESSMENTS IN THE. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to develop a common core state standards assessment in the Hawaiian language including a:

- (1) A detailed listing of all uses of the appropriated funds, including a proposed plan for implementation after the assessment is completed;
- (2) Identification and justification for any future costs including but not limited to estimated costs for materials, implementation, and maintenance; and
- (3) Any projected challenges and their effects on implementation, and the Department's plans for score reporting.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

PART III, SECTION 20

PUBLIC LIBRARIES, STRATEGIC PLAN FOR. Requires the <u>public libraries</u> (EDN407) to prepare a five year strategic plan including:

- (1) A detailed description of program-wide and library-specific goals;
- (2) An analysis of the needs of each library's surrounding community, anticipated changes in the use of the library in response to those changing needs, and an explanation of how the library plans to meet those needs;
- (3) A program-wide and library specific expenditure plan including all means of financing for each of the five years; and
- (4) Anticipated increases or decreases in demand for services, including anticipated impact to program expenditures resulting from those changes and detailed forecasts in anticipated clientele numbers and corresponding funding needs by library facility.

Further requires the plan to be submitted to the Legislature no later than June 30, 2014.

PART III, SECTION 29

SEQUESTRATION, TRANSFER OF FUNDS TO MITIGATE. Requires the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> to report a transfer of made to a state agency no later than ten days after the transfer to the Legislature and submit a summary report of all transfers made no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

PART III, SECTION 30

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE EXEMPT POSITIONS. Authorizes positions and funds to be

transferred to the departments requiring temporary staff support with the approval of the Governor and requires the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> to submit a report to the Legislature no later than sixty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VI, SECTION 61

AIRPORT REVENUE FUND AND PASSENGER FACILITY CHARGE SPECIAL FUND. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to use the funds to finance those projects authorized in part II and listed in part IV of this Act where the method of financing is designated to be by airport revenue bond funds and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VI, SECTION 62

RENTAL MOTOR VEHICLE CUSTOMER FACILITY CHARGE SPECIAL FUND. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to use the fund to finance those projects authorized in part II and listed in part IV of this Act where the method of financing is designated to be by rental motor vehicle customer facility revenue bond funds and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# PART VI, SECTION 63

HARBOR REVENUE FUND. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to use the fund to finance those projects authorized in part II and listed in part IV of this Act where the method of financing is designated to be by harbor revenue bond funds and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VI, SECTION 64

HIGHWAY REVENUE FUND. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to use the fund to finance those projects authorized in part II and listed in part IV of this Act where the method of financing is designated to be by highway revenue bond funds and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# PART VI, SECTION 65

HAWAIIAN HOME LANDS REVENUE BOND SPECIAL FUND. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to use the rental fund to finance those projects authorized in part II and listed in part IV of this Act where the method of financing is designated to be by the Hawaiian Home Lands revenue bond funds and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this

authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

#### PART VI. SECTION 66

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SPECIAL FUNDS. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to use the rental fund to finance those projects authorized in part II and listed in part IV of this Act where the method of financing is designated to be by the University of Hawaii revenue bond funds and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 67

GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND FUNDS FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to replace general obligation bond funds appropriated for capital improvement projects with general obligation reimbursable bond funds, when the expenditure of such general obligation reimbursable bond funds is deemed appropriate for the project and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 68

HIGHWAY FUND, HARBOR SPECIAL FUND, BOATING SPECIAL FUND, AIRPORT REVENUE FUND, SPECIAL LAND AND DEVELOPMENT FUND, OR OTHER APPROPRIATE FUNDS. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to use the state highway fund, the harbor special fund, the boating special fund, the airport revenue fund, the special land and development fund, or other appropriate special funds to finance the respective public undertaking, improvement, or system described above and authorized in this Act, where the method of financing is designated to be general obligation bond fund with debt service cost to be paid from the funds and submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 69

SPECIAL FUNDS AND REVOLVING FUNDS Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to make supplemental allotments from the special fund or revolving fund responsible for cash or debt service payments for the projects, or transfer unrequired balances from other unlapsed projects in this Act or prior appropriation acts which authorized the use of special funds, general obligation bond fund with debt service costs to be paid from special funds, revenue bond funds, or revolving funds; provided that such supplemental allotments shall not be used to increase the scope of the project and provided that such supplemental allotments shall not impair the ability of the fund to meet the purposes for which it was established.

Requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

#### PART VII. SECTION 70

AIRPORT REVENUE FUND AND AIRPORT REVENUE BOND FUND. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to make supplemental allotments from the airport revenue fund or airport revenue bond fund or transfer other balances from other unlapsed projects in this Act or prior appropriation acts to increase the passenger facility charge fund authorization ceiling for the program to accommodate the expenditure of such funds; and provided further that the Governor shall submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 71

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FUNDS. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to supplement funds for any cost element for a capital improvement project authorized under this Act by transferring such sums as may be needed from the funds appropriated for other cost elements of the same project by this Act or any other prior or future act that has not lapsed and requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 72

GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND FUND FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS. Provides that after the objectives and purposes of appropriations made in this Act from the general obligation bond fund for capital improvement projects have been met, unrequired balances, except those from University of Hawaii projects, shall be transferred to the project adjustment fund appropriated in part II and described in part IV of this Act, and shall be considered a supplementary appropriation thereto.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# PART VII, SECTION 73

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FUNDS. Provides that If authorized appropriations specified for capital improvement projects listed in this Act or in any other act currently authorized by the Legislature are insufficient, and where the source of funding for the project is designated as the general obligation bond fund, the <u>Governor</u> may make supplemental allotments from the project adjustment fund appropriated in part II and described in part IV of this Act to supplement any currently authorized capital investment cost elements; provided further that such supplemental allotments from the project adjustment fund shall not be used to increase the scope of the project.

Requires the Governor to submit a report all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature of no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 74

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII APPROPRIATIONS FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT. Provides that after the objectives and purposes of appropriations made in this Act from the general obligation bond fund for capital improvement projects for the University of Hawaii have been met, unrequired balances shall be transferred to the University of Hawaii project adjustment fund appropriated in part II and described in part IV of this Act, and shall be considered a supplementary appropriation thereto.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature of no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 75

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII APPROPRIATIONS FOR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS. Provides that if authorized appropriations specified for University of Hawaii capital improvement projects listed in this Act or in any other act currently authorized by the Legislature are insufficient, and where the source of funding for the project is designated as the general obligation bond fund, the <u>Governor</u> may make supplemental allotments from the University of Hawaii project adjustment fund appropriated in part II and described in part IV of this Act to supplement any currently authorized capital investment cost elements; provided further that such supplemental allotments from the project adjustment fund shall not be used to increase the scope of the project.

Requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# PART VII, SECTION 77

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECT FUNDS. Provides that where it has been determined that changed conditions, such as a reduction in the particular population being served, permit the reduction in the scope of a capital improvement project described in this Act, the <u>Governor</u> may authorize such reduction of project scope.

Requires the Governor to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature of no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# PART VII, SECTION 79

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS FUNDS EXPENDING AUTHORITY. Provides that with the approval of the <u>Governor</u>, designated expending agencies for capital improvement

projects authorized in this Act may delegate to other state or county agencies the implementation of projects when it is determined advantageous to do so by both the original expending agency and the agency to which expending authority is to be delegated.

Requires the Governor to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 81

NATURAL DISASTER OR UNFORESEEN EMERGENCY FUNDS. Allows the <u>Governor</u> to authorize the expenditure of funds for capital improvement projects not previously authorized in this Act to cope with the effects of natural disasters or unforeseen emergencies, when the effects of the natural disasters or unforeseen emergencies create an urgent need to pursue a course of action that is in the best interest of the State; provided further that no funds shall be expended without a formal declaration of a natural disaster or emergency by the Governor; and provided further that the Governor shall use the project adjustment fund authorized in part II and described in part IV to accomplish the purposes of this section.

Requires the Governor to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

#### PART VII, SECTION 82

NATURAL DISASTER OR UNFORESEEN EMERGENCY FUNDS. Allows the <u>Governor</u> may transfer savings or unrequired balances as may be available from the appropriated funds of any program in this Act to supplement the appropriation for any other program in this Act to cope with the effects of natural disasters or other unforeseen emergencies; provided that the effects of such natural disasters or emergencies create an urgent need to pursue a course of action which is in the best interest of the State; provided further that the use of such funds does not conflict with general law; and provided further that no funds shall be expended without a formal declaration of a natural disaster or emergency by the Governor.

Requires the Governor to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# PART VII, SECTION 87

FEDERAL FUNDS CUTBACK. Provides that in the event of federal funding cutbacks the Governor is authorized to utilize savings as determined to be available from other state programs for the purpose of maintaining such programs until the next legislative session.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 88

FEDERAL FUNDS. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to approve the expenditure of all federal funds that are in excess of levels authorized by the Legislature; provided further that the Governor may allow for an increase in the appropriate federal fund authorization ceiling for the program to accommodate the expenditure of such funds.

Requires the Governor to submit a report that includes the date when the program to receive the federal funds was first notified that additional federal funds may be available, the date that additional federal funds were known to be available, the reasons why additional federal fund appropriations were not sought during the preceding legislative session, and an explanation of the public benefit to the Legislature no less than five days prior to the approval.

Provides that if federal funds are received as a result of a natural or manmade disaster, the Governor shall submit notification to the Legislature within five days after the Governor's approval to expend funds has been granted and requires the Governor to submit a summary report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

#### PART VII, SECTION 89

PRIVATE FUNDS OR PROPERTY. Provides that where an agency is authorized to secure funds or other property from private organizations or individuals to be expended or utilized in connection with any authorized program, the <u>agency</u>, with the <u>Governor's</u> approval, may enter into such undertaking, provided that the provisions of the undertaking comply with applicable state constitutional and statutory requirements.

Requires the Governor to notify the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority and submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

# PART VII, SECTION 92

OPERATING FUNDS. Authorizes the <u>Governor</u> to transfer operating funds between appropriations within the same fund, within an expending agency, for operating purposes.

Requires the Governor to submit a report that includes include the date of transfer, the amount of the transfer, the program ID from which funds were transferred, the program ID to which funds were transferred, the impact to the program ID funds are transferred from, and a detailed explanation of the public purposes served by the transfer of resources to the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority.

Further requires the Governor to submit a summary report containing the aforementioned information for each use of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 submit to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 93

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE POSITIONS. Authorizes each department or agency to transfer positions within its respective authorized position ceiling for the purpose of maximizing the utilization of personnel resources and staff productivity; provided further that all such actions shall be with the prior approval of the <u>Governor</u> and shall be consistent with appropriations provided in this Act and with provisions of part II of chapter 37, Hawaii Revised Statutes.

Requires the Governor to submit a report that includes the date of the transfer, the position transferred, the program from which the position was transferred, the program to which the position was transferred, responsibilities of the position prior to transfer, the responsibilities of the position after the transfer, and the manner in which the transfer maximizes the utilization of personnel resources and staff productivity to the Legislature within five days of each use of this authority.

Further requires the Governor to submit a summary report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

#### PART VII, SECTION 94

POPULATION AND WORKLOAD DATA FUNDING. Requires affected agencies to reduce expenditures below appropriations under procedures prescribed by the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> if actual population and workload trends are less than the figures projected.

Requires the Department to notify the Legislature within five business days of each application of this proviso and submit a report of all applications of this proviso for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30, to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 95.

AUDIT SERVICES FUNDS. Provides that with the approval of the <u>Governor</u>, agencies that use appropriations authorized in part II of this Act for audit services may delegate that responsibility and transfer funds to the internal post audit program (AGS104), when it is determined by such agencies that it is advantageous to do so.

Requires the Governor to submit a summary report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 96

PLANNING, LAND ACQUISITION, DESIGN CONSTRUCTION, AND EQUIPMENT FOR REPAIR AND ALTERATIONS FUNDS. Provides that with the approval of the <u>Governor</u>, expending agencies that use appropriations authorized in part II of this Act for planning, land acquisition, design, construction, and equipment for repair and alterations may delegate responsibility and transfer funds to the construction program (AGS221) for the implementation of the repair and alterations, when it is determined by the agencies that it is advantageous to do so.

Requires the Governor to submit a summary report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 98

HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION'S PATIENTS FUNDS. Provides that with the approval of the <u>Governor</u>, the Hawaii Health Systems Corporation may transfer to the Department of Human Services funds appropriated to the Corporation for the care and treatment of patients, whenever the Department can utilize such funds to match federal funds that may be available to help finance the cost of outpatient, acute hospital, or long-term care of indigents or medical indigents in designated critical access hospitals.

Requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 99

DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH PATIENT FUNDS. Provides that with the approval of the <u>Governor</u>, the Department of Health may transfer to the Department of Human Services funds appropriated to the Department of Health for the care and treatment of patients, whenever the Department of Human Services can utilize such funds to match federal funds to finance the cost of outpatient, hospital, or skilled nursing home care of indigents or medical indigents.

Requires the Governor to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 100

OUTPATIENT, HOSPITAL, AND SKILLED NURSING HOME CARE OF INDIGENTS FUNDS. Allows the Department of Human Services to enter into agreements with the Department of Health to furnish outpatient, hospital, and skilled nursing home care of indigents or medical indigents and to pay the Department of Health for such care and that with the approval of the director of finance to deposit part of such receipts into the appropriations from which transfers were made as provided elsewhere in this Act.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 103

PROTOCOL ACCOUNT. Requires the <u>Director of Finance</u> to prepare a detailed report of all expenditures made from the protocol account that shall include the date of any expenditure, the purpose of any expenditure, the name of the entity that received the funds, and an explanation of the manner in which the expenditures promoted and improved the state bond ratings and sales and submit the report to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 109

GENERAL FUND, SPECIAL FUND, AND REVOLVING FUND BALANCES. Authorizes the Director of Finance to expend general fund, special fund, and revolving fund savings or balances determined to be available from authorized general fund, special fund, and revolving fund program appropriations to finance the acquisition of depreciable assets, including, but not limited to, automobiles, computers, printers, and telecommunications equipment and provides that designated expending agencies (including the Department of Education and the University of Hawaii) for municipal lease payments and for depreciable assets, including, but not limited to, automobiles, computers, printers, and telecommunications equipment authorized in this Act may delegate to the Director of Finance the implementation of such acquisitions when it is determined by all involved agencies that it is advantageous to do so.

Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a summary report of all uses of this authority for the previous twelve month period from December 1 to November 30 to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 113

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE POSITIONS. Provides that if an agency or department intends to fill a temporary or permanent position, the funding for which is not, the agency or department head shall notify in writing the Legislature and <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> of the intent to do so.

Department of Budget and Finance to submit a summary report listing all unauthorized positions filled during each fiscal period to the Legislature within fifteen days of the end of the applicable fiscal period.

## PART VII, SECTION 115

OFFICE OF INFORMATION MANAGEMENT AND TECHNOLOGY FUNDS. Allows the <u>Office of Information Management and Technology</u> to transfer appropriations between funded budget sequences and to submit a report of each transfer of appropriations between budget sequences within ten days of the transfer to the Legislature.

#### PART VII, SECTION 116

RISK MANAGEMENT STUDY. Requires the <u>Comptroller</u> to conduct a study of the risk management program of the State that includes:

- (1) A description of the best practices of risk management applicable to the State, identification of the State's present deficiencies in relation to the best practices, and estimation of the costs and benefits of implementing the best practices;
- (2) The identification of the optimum level of funding for the risk management program that is affordable to the State, itemized by insurance premium costs, self-insurance losses, risk retention reserves, loss prevention costs, loss adjustment costs, administrative costs, and other relevant costs;
- (3) An evaluation of the various risks of the State and the effectiveness and appropriateness of the present amounts of insurance, self-insurance, and loss retention for the risks:
- (4) A review of the procurement of insurance policies, with the purpose of promoting the procurement from responsible insurers of insurance policies providing the best coverage at the least cost;
- (5) An examination of whether insurance, loss, and administrative costs incurred by state programs or projects funded by non-general funds are properly allocated to and paid from those non-general funds; and
- (6) A recommendation of changes to administrative policies or amendments of law necessary to improve the risk management program of the State.

Further requires the Comptroller to submit the study, with findings and recommendations, to the Governor and Legislature before January 1, 2014.

#### PART VII, SECTION 117

TANF AND TAONF PROGRAM FUNDS. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report to include but not be limited to a detailed financial plan by means of financing for all funds expended under the TANF and TAONF programs that shall encompass projected and actual expenditures for the prior two fiscal years, projected and estimated expenditures for the current fiscal year, and projected expenditures for the next two fiscal years; provided further that all variances shall be explained. Requires the financial plan to include the balance of funds in the TANF Federal Reserve Fund for each of the fiscal years in the report; provided further that the financial plan shall include program ID numbers, contract names and priority numbers for each line item.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VIII, SECTION 118

TANF AND TAONF PROGRAMS, EFFECTIVENESS OF. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to prepare a report on the TANF and TAONF programs for the prior and current fiscal year that includes:

- (1) The program's measures of effectiveness, projected, and actual outcomes;
- (2) Work participation rates for two-parent families and all families included in calculation of the federal work participation rate;

- (3) A listing of Hawaii businesses participating in TANF and TAONF funded work programs and amounts subsidized;
- (4) A listing of all contracts funded by the TANF and TAONF programs categorized by purpose that identifies program priority levels, amounts contracted, means of financing, an explanation of the benefits derived from each contract, and identification of all laws that require the state to provide the service; and
- (5) Utilization levels of each contract funded by the TANF and TAONF programs and populations served.

Further requires the Department shall submit the report to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 119

MEDICAID SERVICES, COST REDUCTION PLAN. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to develop a plan to reduce the costs of all Medicaid services beginning in fiscal year 2014-2015 and thereafter; provided further that the plan furnishes cost reduction scenarios ranging from no less than fifteen per cent and up to thirty per cent of funds appropriated for Medicaid in fiscal year 2013-2014, and that the plan be submitted to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

## PART VII, SECTION 121

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION, TRANSFER OF FUNDS. Provides that if the <a href="Department of Education">Department of Education</a> decides to transfer funds appropriated for school-based budgeting (EDN100) to another program, the Department shall provide to each member of the Legislature written notice of the transfer at least ten days before final approval of the transfer.

## PART VII, SECTION 123

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION AND CHARTER SCHOOL PER PUPIL FUNDS. Requires the <u>Director of Finance</u> to ensure that non-facility per-pupil general fund amounts allocated for Department of Education and charter school students are equal on an annualized fiscal year basis and requires the director to:

- (1) Determine the sum of general fund appropriations made for the Department of Education and charter school student non-facility costs:
- (2) Determine the sum of Department of Education and charter school student enrollment based upon verified actual student enrollment counts;
- (3) Determine a per-pupil amount by dividing the sum of general fund appropriations determined under paragraph (1) by the sum of student enrollment determined under paragraph (2);
- (4) Transfer a general fund amount between the Department of Education and charter schools prior to November 1, 2013, and November 1, 2014, that will provide each with a per-pupil allocation equal to the amount determined on an annualized fiscal year basis under paragraph (3); and

(5) Account for all calculations and transfers made pursuant to this section in a report to the Legislature, Governor, Department of Education, and charter schools within ten days of any transfer.

## PART VII, SECTION 124

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION'S BUDGET. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that includes:

- (1) Information and calculations for each fiscal year from fiscal year 2012-2013 to 2014-2015 on the amount and proportion of the Department's operating budget that was expended for administrative costs and the amount and proportion of the Department's operating budget that was expended by principals, by means of financing; and
- (2) The Department's plan that will enable it to comply with the requirements of section 302A-1301(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes, for fiscal year 2013-2014 and fiscal year 2014-2015.

Further requires the Department to submit the report to the Legislature no later than sixty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 125

DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION MEANS OF FINANCING AND ENROLLMENT COUNT. Requires the <u>Department of Education</u> to prepare a report that shall includes a detailed breakout of the all means of financing budget for the current and next fiscal year and actual expenditures for the last completed fiscal year for each school, a report of all other funds expended on behalf of each school and a report detailing by school:

- (1) The enrollment projections used to submit the current budget request;
- (2) The actual October 15, 2013, and the actual October 15, 2014, enrollment count as reported by each school for the current school year;
- (3) The Department's reviewed and verified October 15, 2013, and October 15, 2014, enrollment count; and
- (4) The Department 's reviewed and verified November 15, 2013, and November 15, 2014, enrollment count.

Further requires the Department to submit these reports to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 126

CHARTER SCHOOLS MEANS OF FINANCING AND ENROLLMENT COUNT. Requires the <u>charter schools</u> to prepare a report that includes a detailed breakout of the all means of financing budget for the current and next fiscal year and actual expenditures for the last completed fiscal year for each charter school and a report of all other funds expended on behalf of each school and a report detailing by school:

- (1) The enrollment projections used to submit the current budget request;
- (2) The actual October 15, 2013, and the actual October 15, 2014, enrollment count as reported by each school for the current school year;

- (3) The <u>Public Charter School Commission's</u> reviewed and verified October 15, 2013, and October 15, 2014, enrollment count; and
- (4) The Commission's reviewed and verified November 15, 2013, and November 15, 2014, enrollment count.

Further requires the Commission to submit these reports to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 127

CHARTER SCHOOL CONTRACTS. Requires the <u>Public Charter School Commission</u> to submit a report on the status of charter contracts between the commission and charter schools during the preceding calendar that includes a list of schools with charter contracts and the date of execution and term of the contracts and a list of charter schools without charter contracts, the reason for the lack of a contract, and the amount of general funds withheld from the charter school to the Legislature before the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

## PART VII, SECTION 129

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII REVENUE SOURCES. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a report on all of its revenue sources that includes

- (1) A description of each source of revenue to include identification of the source and amounts:
- (2) The actual and projected uses for each source of revenue identified by specific categories for expenditure and amounts; and
- (3) Identification of all obligations, projected obligations, and amounts placed on each source of revenue in excess of those identified in paragraph (2), including but not limited to revenues and reserves required to issue and pay the debt service on bonds, fund other debt instruments, fund projected collective bargaining increases, and initiate or expand programs.

Further requires the report to cover actual and projected data for fiscal year 2013-2014 and fiscal year 2014-2015 and projections for the subsequent six-year planning period and that the University submit the report to the Legislature no later than sixty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015

# PART VII, SECTION 130

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII SALARIES. Provides that before the <u>University of Hawaii</u> renews or extends the employment of or initially appoints an officer or employee whose prospective annual salary is at least the same as the annual salary of the Governor, the University's Board of Regents shall approve that prospective annual salary.

Requires the <u>Chair of Board</u> to certify that the university has complied with this section during each fiscal year of the fiscal biennium 2013-2015 and that the certification be submitted to the Legislature before the January 1 immediately following the end of the fiscal year.

# PART VII, SECTION 131

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII GRADUATES, APPOINTMENT OF. Requires the <u>President of the University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a report on the appointment of graduates of the University to executive and managerial positions and faculty and to include:

- A list of executive and managerial and faculty positions filled during the fiscal year; the positions on the list filled by persons with associate, bachelor, or graduate degrees from the University; and
- (2) The number of persons with such degrees who applied for, but were not appointed to, each of the executive and managerial or faculty positions filled during the fiscal year.

Further requires the report for a fiscal year to be submitted to the Legislature before the January 1 immediately following the end of the fiscal year.

# PART VII, SECTION 132

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS AMONG CAMPUSES. Requires the <u>President of the University of Hawaii</u> to prepare a plan to reallocate the general fund appropriation for the University of Hawaii for each fiscal year of the fiscal period 2014-2015 through 2020-2021 to achieve a distribution among the campuses based on funding need and not the ability to generate non-general revenues or amount of past general fund appropriations. In particular, the president shall consider a reallocation that decreases the proportion appropriated for the University of Hawaii, Manoa (UOH100), and increases the proportions appropriated to other campuses that are projected to experience a:

- (1) Greater student enrollment growth rate compared to the rates of other campuses;
- (2) Greater operating expenditure growth rate compared to the rates of other campuses; or
- (3) Greater difference between operating expenditure growth rate and tuition growth rate compared to the differences of other campuses.

Further requires the President to submit the plan to the board of regents of the University of Hawaii, Governor, and Legislature before January 1, 2014.

## PART VII, SECTION 133

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII'S PUBLIC RELATIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS POSITIONS. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii Board of Regents</u> to conduct a review of the university's public relations and communications positions that identifies or addresses:

- (1) The number of positions for which at least fifty per cent of each position's work hours is spent on public, government, or media relations, authorized for the university;
- (2) The change in the number of these positions between fiscal year 2000-2001 and fiscal year 2013-2014;
- (3) The number of these positions filled as of October 1, 2013; and
- (4) A determination of whether a reduction of at least twenty-five per cent of these positions is warranted.

Further requires the Board to submit the review to the Legislature before the convening of the regular session of 2014.

## PART VII, SECTION 134

UNIVERSITY OF HAWAII'S EXECUTIVE AND MANAGERIAL PERSONNEL. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii Board of Regents</u> to review and, if deemed necessary, recommend revisions to the current policies on the appointment and retention of, and compensation and prerequisites for, executive and managerial personnel in order to achieve a proper balance among the following:

- (1) Attractiveness of the positions to qualified persons dedicated to promoting the best interests of the university and the State;
- (2) Competitiveness with peer institutions;
- (3) Affordability to state taxpayers and university students; and
- (4) Comparison with other state agencies' executive and managerial officers who have similar duties and responsibilities.

Further requires the Board to determine whether it should rescind any delegation of authority to the University President or other officer of the university to appoint a person to an executive or managerial position and submit its findings and recommendations to the Legislature before the convening of the regular session of 2014.

## PART VII, SECTION 136

STATE PROGRAMS BUDGETS. Requires the <u>Director of Finance</u> to submit to the Legislature recommendations to more accurately align budgeting for operating programs with actual expenditures of the programs. Provides that the director's recommendations shall be intended to:

- Result in the submission to the Legislature of full, realistic funding requests for the anticipated expenditures for all positions, current expenses, and equipment authorized for a program;
- (2) Eliminate the following: negative adjustments in the budget details for a program, reliance on vacancy and turnover savings to fund other items in a program, avoidance of filling authorized positions in order to use funds budgeted for the positions for other purposes, and establishment of positions unauthorized by the Legislature;
- (3) Minimize the transfer of funds between cost elements and programs to pay for shortfalls, contingencies, emergencies, or other unanticipated costs;
- (4) Balance an expending agency's need for flexibility in the expenditure of appropriations to meet needs anticipated and unanticipated during formulation and enactment of the executive budget with the Legislature's responsibility to make appropriations for public programs deemed necessary or desirable; and
- (5) Increase transparency in budgeting and expenditures.

## PART VII, 138

PUBLIC EMPLOYEE POSITIONS ABOLISHED. Requires every <u>department</u> to prepare a report on all positions abolished pursuant to legislative budget adjustments made under

this Act, which includes the position number, title, full time equivalent amount, indication of whether the position is temporary or permanent, and budgeted salary by means of financing, for each program ID and submit the report to the Legislature no later than August 1, 2013.

PART VII, Section 140

DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION SPECIAL MAINTENANCE PROGRAMS. Requires the <u>Department of Transportation</u> to prepare a report on all budgeted and actual expenditures for special maintenance programs by program ID and means of financing for the prior three fiscal years, budgeted and estimated for the current fiscal year, and budgeted and projected for the next fiscal year.

Further requires that all variances from budgeted amount be explained; and provided further that the Department shall submit the report to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

PART 141, SECTION 141

HAWAII CONVENTION CENTER REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE PROJECTS. Requires the <u>Hawaii Tourism Authority</u> to work with the <u>Department of Budget and Finance</u> to restructure the debt service payments on the Hawaii Convention Center to take advantage of current interest rates, where savings from the debt restructuring shall be used to address and enhance operations and provide for major repair and maintenance projects at the Hawaii Convention Center, including the upgrading and enhancement of the Hawaii Convention Center.

TRANSIENT ACCOMMODATIONS REVENUES TO THE COUNTIES. Requires the <u>Hawaii Tourism Authority</u> to establish a <u>working group</u> which includes the <u>counties</u> and the <u>Director of Finance</u>, to consider the original legislative intent and to evaluate alternative approaches for the more effective, efficient, and productive allocation of transient accommodations tax revenues to the counties.

Further requires the Authority shall also examine the current allocations and funding levels and the use of the current allocation of the tax revenues.

Further requires the Authority shall submit a report of findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than thirty days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2014.

(HSCR 928, SSCR 1241, CCR 105)

# HB 266, HD1, SD2, CD1

MULTILINGUAL WEBSITE PILOT PROJECT. Requires the <u>Office of Language Access</u>, in collaboration with other <u>state agencies</u>, to implement a multilingual website pilot project that shall:

(1) Explore the utility and feasibility of creating a multilingual website to improve language access to information provided online for limited English proficient

- persons seeking information about government and government-funded services in the State; and
- (2) To the extent feasible, produce a multilingual website for use by the public for the twelve largest limited English proficient groups in the State.

Further requires the Office to submit a report detailing findings and recommendations, including proposed legislation, regarding the pilot project to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular session of 2017.

## HB 398, HD1, SD2, CD1

HOME AND COMMUNITY-BASED FACILITIES, TRANSITION OF OVERSIGHT OF. Establishes a <u>working group</u> to review issues relating to the transition of oversight of home and community-based facilities from the Department of Human Services to the Department of Health and requires the working group to consist of:

- (1) The <u>Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Committees on Human</u> Services, who shall serve as co-chairs;
- (2) One representative from the Department of Human Services;
- (3) One representative from the Department of Health;
- (4) Four representatives of community care foster family homes, of which two representatives shall be appointed by the Senate President and two representatives shall be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives;
- (5) <u>Four representatives of adult residential care homes</u>, of which two representatives shall be appointed by the President and two representatives shall be appointed by the Speaker;
- (6) Two representatives from adult day care centers, of which one representative shall be appointed by the President and one representative shall be appointed by the Speaker;
- (7) Two representatives of developmental disabilities domiciliary homes, of which one representative shall be appointed by the President and one representative shall be appointed by the Speaker;
- (8) Two representatives of adult foster homes, of which one representative shall be appointed by the President and one representative shall be appointed by the Speaker; and
- (9) Two representatives of licensed case management agencies, of which one representative shall be appointed by the President and one representative shall be appointed by the Speaker.

Requires the working group to submit a written report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

(HSCR 311, 836, SCR 931, 1363, CCR 71)

## HB 546, HD2, SD2, CD1

HAWAII EMPLOYER-UNION HEALTH BENEFITS TRUST FUND'S SEPARATE TRUST FUND. Requires the <u>Director of Finance</u> submit an implementation plan and any proposed legislation to execute the following:

- (1) Joint use of any investment information, advice, and services provided by fund managers retained by the board of trustees of the employees' retirement system with the board of trustees of the employer-union health benefits trust fund for the purpose of investing moneys contained in the separate trust fund established under section 87A-42, Hawaii Revised Statutes; and
- (2) Procedures to accept and deposit employer contributions from county public employers into the separate trust fund established under section 87A-42, Hawaii Revised Statutes

to the Legislature not less than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015.

(HSCR 318, 859, SSCR 964, 1380, CCR 144)

# HB 656, HD2, SD2, CD1

HEALTH CARE TRANSFORMATION PROGRAM. Requires the <u>Governor</u> to submit a progress report containing the status of the health care transformation program, including findings and recommendations to the legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014 and a final report on the health care transformation program, including findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2015.

(HSCR 370, 843, SSCR 924, 1351, CCR 35)

## HB 668, HD2, SD2, CD1

MEDICAL USE OF MARIJUANA PROGRAM, TRANSFER OF. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> and the <u>Department of Health</u> to submit a joint report on the transfer of the medical use of marijuana program, including the plan and timeline for the transfer, and the progress made, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2014 and 2015.

(HSCR 478, 905, SSCR 1005, 1377, CCR 178)

#### HB 673, HD2, SD2, CD1

PESTICIDES, RESTRICTED USE. Requires the <u>Legislative Reference Bureau</u> to conduct a study on pesticides that includes whether other states impose any type of reporting requirements on pesticides that do not fall within the definition of a restricted use pesticide,

and if so, the details of the reporting requirement and any other relevant information, to the extent ascertainable and submit a report to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

(HSCR 251, 550, 647, SSCR 980, 1270, CCR 26)

#### HB 726, HD1, SD2, CD1

MOTION PICTURE, DIGITAL MEDIA, AND FILM PRODUCTION INCOME TAX CREDIT. Requires the <u>Department of Business</u>, <u>Economic Development</u>, <u>and Tourism</u> to submit an annual report that contains a cost benefit analysis of the motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit, including:

- (1) The total number of full-time, part-time, and contract personnel on the payroll necessary to administer the motion picture, digital media, and film production income tax credit; and
- (2) The average wage of each of the above personnel groups and total earnings for the year

to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to each Regular Session beginning with the Regular Session of 2014. (Tax credit to be repealed on January 1, 2019.)

## HB 951, HD1, SD2, CD1

PROCESS SERVERS, REGULATION OF. Requires the <u>Department of Public Safety</u> to convene a <u>working group</u> composed of

- (1) Two current process servers to be appointed by the Governor;
- (2) Two current employees of the Sheriff Division to be appointed by the Director of Public Safety:
- (3) Two employees of the Judiciary to be appointed by the Chief Justice;
- (4) Two members of the Hawaii State Bar Association to be appointed by the President of the Association;
- (5) A representative from the Professional and Vocational Licensing Division of the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs appointed by the Director of Commerce and Consumer Affairs; and
- (6) The Director of Public Safety, as an ex officio member, to serve as chair.

# Requires the working group to:

- (1) Define and delineate the duties and responsibilities of process servers under its jurisdiction;
- (2) Create a process of registration for process servers in the State;
- (3) Examine the licensing requirements of and jurisdictional concerns with the private process server industry in the State; and
- (4) Address other issues deemed relevant by the working group or by the Department of Public Safety.

Further requires the working group to report its findings and recommendations to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

#### HB 1207, HD1, SD1, CD1

MEDICAID PROGRAM INTEGRITY. Requires the <u>Department of Human Services</u> to submit interim reports on the State's program integrity compliance with the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 with respect to medicaid program integrity within the managed care health plans, fee-for-service program, and the children's health insurance program, including the timelines and plans for compliance with the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 for fiscal years 2013-2014, 2014-2015, and 2015-2016, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Sessions of 2015 and 2016.

Further requires each report to include information or the Department's compliance status with various provisions of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 as they relate to:

- (1) Implementation of provider enrollment, screening verification, and termination programs;
- (2) Implementation of recovery audit contractor programs;
- (3) Implementation of processes to provide managed care oversight of the Department's mandated fraud and abuse programs;
- (4) Implementation of means to prohibit false statements and representations, including the Department's processes of verification of the beneficiary receipt of services claimed by managed care health plans via explanation of benefits forms or other approved methods;
- (5) The projected cost savings per program per fiscal year:
- (6) Activities taken by the Department's internal program integrity section to prevent and reduce fraud, waste, and abuse, including overpayments recovered and number of fraud reports received by the Department from the QUEST and QUEST Expanded Access health plans, fee-for-service program, and the children's health insurance program each cited fiscal year; and
- (7) Number of referrals to the Department of the Attorney General's medicaid fraud control unit.

Further requires the Department to submit a report on the final status of implementing and complying with the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010 with respect to program integrity, to the Legislature no later than twenty days before the convening of the Regular Session of 2017.

#### HB 1396, HD1, SD2, CD1

NISEI LEGACY CENTER, STATUS OF. Requires the <u>University of Hawaii at West Oahu</u> to report on the status of the Nisei Veterans Legacy Center and on the status of grants or donations from public or private sources to the legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

**SCR 20** HCR 25

LAND EXCHANGE BETWEEN HAWAII BAPTIST ACADEMY AND THE STATE. Resolves that the <u>Hawaii Baptist Academy</u> shall pay to the State the difference in value of the public land over the value of the private land together with all improvements thereon.

(SSCR 869, 1427, HSCR 1728, 1767)

SCR 32 HCR 41

KILAUEA POINT LIGHTHOUSE, KAUAI, DESIGNATION AS THE DANIEL K. INOUYE KILAUEA POINT LIGHTHOUSE. Requests the <u>United States Congress</u> to recognize the legacy of the late Senator Daniel K. Inouye by designating the Kilauea Point Lighthouse on the island of Kauai, Hawaii, as the Daniel K. Inouye Kilauea Point Lighthouse.

## **SCR 37, SD1**

OIL-FIRED GENERATION PLANTS, USE OF. Requests the <u>Public Utilities Commission</u> to take into consideration whether stranded costs are a significant factor in the electric utilities' failure to retire their old, oil-fired generation plants and any appropriate measures that would encourage the electric utilities to retire old, oil-fired generation plants and the potential impact this would have on ratepayers.

SCR 41, SD1, HD1 HCR 47, SD1

PROCUREMENT OF GOODS AND SERVICES PURCHASED THROUGH NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS. Requests the task force to finalize recommendations that were initially recommended in the task force's 2012 interim report to the 2013 Legislature to address issues that affect procurement for goods and services purchased through nonprofit organizations, including human service nonprofit organizations that deliver pivotal goods and services to individuals, families, communities, and other small businesses and to:

- (1) Report on its examination of state contracting processes, from the initial planning phase through service delivery, and issues relating to payment when invoices are submitted:
- (2) Make recommendations on processes that can be simplified and standardized between government agencies, the State Procurement Office, the Department of Accounting and General Services, the Department of the Attorney General, and the parties contracted to deliver services; and

## SCR 76 SR 43

HOME SCHOOLED STUDENT PARTICIPATION IN PUBLIC SCHOOL EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES AND SPORTS. Requests the <u>Board of Education</u> to research state models and best practices on home schooled student participation in public school extracurricular activities and sports and explore implementation of such a program in Hawaii and requests the Board to engage with various stakeholders, including but not limited to:

- (1) Public school principals;
- (2) Public school athletic coaches:
- (3) The School Liaison Officers for the United States Army, Air Force, Coast Guard, Marines, and Navy; and
- (4) The Hawai'i Homeschool Association.

Resolves that the Board report its findings and recommendations and any policies developed or implemented by the Board allowing home school students to participate in public school extracurricular activities and sports, and any proposed legislation, if appropriate to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.

- (3) Update information regarding the stroke plan in the Hawaii Plan for the Prevention of Heart Disease and Stroke, issued by the Department of Health in November 2011, including a needs assessment that, in particular, assures that Neighbor Island issues are adequately addressed;

- data registry component through American Heart Association or American Stroke Association super-user licensure for the Department of Health; and
- (9) Recommend protocols regarding direct transportation of stroke patients to appropriate hospitals by emergency medical personnel.

Resolves that the statewide stroke database and registry include performance measurements obtained using a standardized stroke measure set containing data that is consistent with nationally-recognized guidelines on the treatment of individuals with confirmed stroke within the State, such as the American Heart Association's "Get With The Guidelines – Stroke" or The Joint Commission's "Stroke Performance Measurement Implementation Guide".

Requests the task force is requested to submit:

- (4) One member of a prominent community organization that advocates for marriage equality, or the member's designee; and
- (5) One professor of economics from the University of Hawaii at Manoa who coauthored a study on the impact of same-sex marriage on Hawaii's economy and government, or the professor's designee.

Resolves that the task force also include the <u>Speaker of the House of Representatives</u> and the <u>President of the Senate</u> or their designees.

Requests the task force to also:

- (1) Determine whether civil unions are sufficient to provide the rights, benefits, and dignity necessary to ensure strong, healthy families in Hawaii;
- (2) Examine the impact of the forthcoming United States Supreme Court's decisions in United States v. Windsor, regarding the constitutionality of the Defense of Marriage Act, and Hollingsworth v. Perry, regarding the constitutionality of California's ballot initiative banning same-sex marriages known as Proposition 8, which are anticipated by summer of 2013;
- (3) Examine the economic impact of passing, or failing to pass, marriage equality legislation in Hawaii; and

- (1) The Comptroller or the Comptroller's designee;
- (2) The <u>Director of Finance</u> or the director's designee;
- (3) The <u>Director of the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism</u>, or the director's designee;
- (4) The Attorney General or the Attorney General's designee;
- (5) The Senate President or a Senator designated by the Senate President;
- (6) The <u>Speaker of the House of Representatives</u> or a member of the House of Representatives designated by the Speaker; and
- (7) The State's Chief Information Officer.

Requests the Department of Accounting and General Services is requested to submit a report containing the recommendations of the Task Force, including any proposed legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014.
